Nurses from Great Britain who have been abroad for observation visits number 76; 441 nurses from overseas have secured salaried appointments, extended their visits by securing other appointments, and 68 nurses from other countries have been in this country for observation visits.

The number of first interviews granted to nurses by the National Council of Nurses during the year was 867. Truly remarkable!

Miss D. M. Smith was elected a Vice-President, and Miss M. Craven and Miss L. Young elected as Directors.

The Auditors and Hon. Solicitors were duly re-elected and votes of thanks ended a very interesting meeting. All then partook of a delightful tea served by the charming

members of the London Hospital staff.

# The General Nursing Council for England and Wales.

A MEETING OF THE General Nursing Council for England and Wales was held at the offices of the Council, 23, Portland Place, London, W.1, on November 25th, 1955. Miss M. J. Smyth, Chairman, presided.

Sir John Dain, the Returning Officer, gave his report on the election to the Mental Nurses' Committee of the Council. He told us that 21,210 persons were entitled to receive a Ballot Paper; by the appointed day 5,980 were received by him, 1,262 had been returned undelivered by the post office and 102 by relatives. He considers this is the result of the abolition of the annual retention fee and the loss of a regular opportunity for checking addresses.
