

common with the wren. Though a much larger bird, the shape is very similar, particularly in regard to the pert, up-turned tail. The nests, too, bear some similarity, both being domed structures of moss, and there is a distinct likeness between the two songs, both being merry trills with a little upward turn at the end.

The dipper is sometimes accused of doing harm to fisheries by feeding on trout spawn, but there is little doubt that it is guiltless in this respect, and, in fact, it is beneficial, for it feeds on dragonfly larvae and other similar creatures, which are distinctly harmful to the ova of fish.

It is a most shortsighted policy for fish preservers to persecute the bird for fancied misdeeds.

3. State the signs and symptoms that may be found after a severe head injury. Describe fully how the personality may be altered following this type of injury.
4. Give in full the possible complications of continuous narcosis when carried out as a form of treatment. How would you deal with these?
5. Enumerate as far as possible the causes of vomiting. Discuss the treatment of any one condition you mention.
6. What mental symptoms and signs are associated with vascular disease? Describe fully a case with which you have been acquainted.
7. Write short notes on the following:—
 - (a) paralysis agitans;
 - (b) varicose veins;
 - (c) euphoria;
 - (d) scabies;
 - (e) vitamin A.

6. Where are:—
 - (a) the internal capsule;
 - (b) the thalamus;
 - (c) the pons;
 - (d) the optic-chiasma;
 - (e) the pituitary gland?
7. A patient has not changed his position for a few minutes. What could be the causes?

4. Describe in detail how you would nurse an imbecile patient suffering from pleurisy.
5. State what you know of the following:—

 - (c) administration of oxygen;
 - (d) ascites.
6. What complications may occur as a result of prolonged stay in bed, and how may a nurse assist in their prevention?
7. What type of employment do you consider suitable for male or female mentally defective patients sent out to work daily? What factors are important if there is a possibility of discharge?

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
