What Our Members are Doing.

The Honorary Secretary. Dear Madam,

Toronto. June 12th, 1955.

Thank you very much for your kind letter, also thanks for the good wishes for success in my new work in a new country. I am trying to give some account of the experiences I had

since I arrived here. This Hospital for the Treatment of Tuberculosis lies about ten miles from the centre of Toronto City; it has a bed capacity of 640 beds, 26 of these for children.

The treatment for Tuberculosis is about the same as in our country, but the nursing technique differs very much from that I have been taught in England.

Trolleys are never used, trays completely set up are always

kept in readiness for any treatment.

There doesn't appear to be any shortage of Nurses here in Canada, a great many Europeans who have emigrated since the war are employed in various capacities in hospitals. Nurses' aids relieve much of the routine work, which leaves Nurses to carry out Nursing duties.

Hours of duty, 44 hours a week, which allows three free

days in each pay period of two weeks; night duty term is of four weeks approximately every 8 to 12 weeks. Three weeks' vacation after a year is granted, but there are nine statutory holidays allowed.

There is no National Health Service, but a plan, the Blue Cross, is in operation which gives some help in hospital care, deductions are made from authorised payroll.

Comfortable residence, all single rooms, is provided. Nurses have to buy their own uniform; white shoes and

stockings are worn.

Speaking of Toronto, a large industrial city, it lies direct on the Great Lake of Ontario, has some very fine buildings, claims the first subway in Canada and also has some new

modern hospitals.

My impressions, especially as regards hospital life, are very limited as I arrived in Canada only three months ago, but I am now very grateful for the excellent training both in General Nursing, and for the Post Graduate Course for the British Tuberculosis Association Certificate which I was able H. O. to take before I left England.

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
