Medical Research. Only batches of the vaccine which have

passed both series of tests will be released for use.

It is sometimes suggested that a vaccinated child can be infectious to others by reason of vaccination, but with the dead vaccine being used and the stringent safety tests to which it is subjected before being used, this could not happen. "I should like to emphasise," said Miss Hornsby-Smith, "that it is quite impossible for a vaccinated child to infect others simply because he has been vaccinated."
