

Reflections

FROM A BOARD ROOM MIRROR.



PRINCESS CHRISTIAN took part in the concert recently given at the Albert Institute, Windsor, in aid of the Windsor Infant Nursery. Princess VICTORIA of Schleswig-Holstein and a large company were present. Princess CHRISTIAN and Sir WALTER PARRATT, organist of St. George's Chapel, played the "Danse Macabre" (Saint-Saëns), a duet for two pianos, and also took part, together with Miss G. M. LIDDELL, Miss CAROLINE BIGGE, and Sir WALTER PARRATT, in the performance of "Les Contrastes" (Moscheles), a piece for two pianos and eight hands.

MISS MARY HERBERT has been appointed Matron of the General Infirmary, Worcester. She was trained at St. Thomas's Hospital, and has filled the responsible positions of Sister to the Elizabeth Ward, Night Superintendent, and Assistant-Matron in that Institution.

MISS THORPE, who received her training at the Royal Infirmary, Leeds, has been appointed Night Sister to the Royal United Hospital, Bath.

MISS L. CODD has resigned her position as Sister of the Prince of Wales Ward at the above Hospital, and has been succeeded by Miss VERCHILD, trained at the Royal United Hospital, and lately occupying the position of Theatre Sister. Miss CODD, upon leaving, was the recipient of a beautiful bracelet from her colleagues.

MISS EDITH CRUTTWELL, trained and acting as Staff Nurse in the above Hospital, has been promoted to the position of Theatre Sister.

SIR DYCE DUCKWORTH and Sir W. PRIESTLEY have been nominated as the delegates to represent the Royal College of Physicians, London, at the forthcoming International Medical Congress at Rome.

DR. R. THORNE THORNE, C B., Medical Officer to the Local Government Board, and Surgeon-General CUNINGHAM, C.S.I., have left London for Paris, to represent Great Britain and British India respectively as technical delegates at the International Sanitary Conference of Paris, which assembles tomorrow, to devise measures for the control of cholera in the Persian Gulf, the Red Sea, and the holy places during the Mahomedan pilgrimage.

It is stated that the President of the Local Government Board, in view of the probable recrudescence of cholera in the coming summer, has decided to retain the services for another year of Drs. THOMAS HORNE, MACLEAN WILSON, WHEATON, and EVAN EVANS, the four temporary medical inspectors who were specially engaged last year to report on outbreaks of cholera and choleraic diarrhoea.

It is reported that the Charity Commissioners have resolved, at the suggestion of the London County Council, to make an inquiry into the management of the endowed charities of the Metropolis. It is expected that the inquiry will cost at least five thousand pounds, of which the County Council will defray one-half. It is not stated whether the Commission will have power to inquire into the management of the great endowed Hospitals, but it is thought to be not improbable that some of the managers of our Hospitals will be called upon to give an account of their stewardship.
