will at the present day generally find themselves called upon to take charge of patients upon whom the latter operation has been performed, yet in the future it is probable that the former class of operation will be the most frequently performed.

London Reform Sunday.

In answer to an appeal of the Executive Committee of the London Reform Union, the subject of "Citizenship" was last Sunday treated in between 200 and 300 churches, chapels, and halls of the Metropolis. No subscriptions were asked in aid of the Union; the one idea was to impress upon the people of London a deep sense of their civic responsibilities. At St. Paul's Cathedral, Canon Browne referred specially to the poor and needy; Prebendary Eyton, at Holy Trinity, Sloane Square, to the necessity for the more active service of the "religious"; Professor Shuttleworth, at St. Nicholas Cole Abbey, to the "City of God"; Mrs. Ormiston Chant preached twice, and referred, in the course of her remarks, to Public Amusements.

"For the Union of all who love, in the service of all who suffer"-that was the key-note and object of Mr. Stead's monster Meetings in the Queen's Hall, Langham Place, last Sunday. Representatives of every class in Society were there—politicians, County Councillors, editors, theatre managers, actors, clergymen, journalists, labour leaders, music hall artistes; women engaged in work, whether Poor Law administration, as art students or as Nurses. At the afternoon Meeting, Mr. Branch took the chair—a duty which he said gave him far more pleasure than when nine years ago he acted as foreman of the jury at Mr. STEAD'S trial. Mr. STEAD then started up; and with intense earnestness, though somewhat dramatically, he began: "Sons of God, Daughters of God, brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ, let us pray. He then went on to discuss—What Christ would have us do at the coming Elections. In the afternoon he confined himself specially to the School Board Elections. In the evening he dealt with Women's responsibilities at the elections. "Whether Secularists or Anti-Secularists," said he in the afternoon, "they could all agree on one point—that the interests of the children should be taken care of; that they should not be starved either physicallly or intellectually." Mrs. Ormiston Chant sat on Mr. Stead's right hand, and when she was called upon to say a few words, the cheers, again and again renewed, were deafening, a large number standing up and waving pocket handkerchiefs or umbrellas, and when she referred to their late victory, and to the splendid municipal government of the County Council, there was another out burst of applause.
