A NURSING EXHIBITION.

THE value of an exhibition of the many appliances used in modern Nursing needs no explanation; and the popularity as well as the usefulness of such an illustration of Nursing methods was fully proved in the case of the British Nursing Section at the Chicago Exhibition. That section was organised, of course, under the serious disadvantages consequent upon the distance between the country in which the Exhibition was prepared, and the place at which it was shown. But the cordiality with which it was received, both by the public and by the professional visitors to the Exposition, and the high praise accorded to it in the official reports, were sufficient to convince its organiser, Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, that a similar exhibition in London would be of much educational benefit to Nurses, and would probably also arouse much popular interest in the work of Nursing. On her return to England, therefore, in 1893, she suggested that such an Exhibition should be organised, and had hoped that the suggestion would ere now have been carried into effect.
