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Editorial.

NURSING LEGISLATION .-- II.

'E commenced last week to consider this important matter, and a strange and unexpected illustration and proof of a statement which we then made-that there was a widespread feeling in favour of legislation for Nurses—has since come to our knowledge. An important Committee, appointed by the British Medical Association to consider complaints made by general practitioners, has issued an interim report which was presented last week to, and adopted by, the General Meeting of members of that Association. In that Report we find the following most significant words :—" This Committee recommends the Council to en-deavour to formulate and agree upon a scheme for the training and registration of all classes of Nurses, amongst which those who, in addition to their regular hospital training, shall have qualified by a special course of instruction at a lying-in hospital, will be registered as obstetric Nurses." Then, as our report of the Meeting of the British Association last week has already shown, the important Resolution not work has already Dr. Bedford Fenwick, and which was passed almost with enthusiasm by the great meeting of medical men drawn from all parts of the United Kingdom, proves still further, not only the keen interest which the medical profession takes in the work of Nurses, but also the feeling, to
