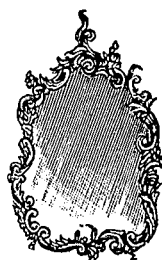

Reflections

FROM A BOARD ROOM MIRROR.



"WORKHOUSE Reform" has been prominently put before many constituencies, especially in agricultural districts during the late elections, as a point on which candidates pledge themselves to work. The farm labourer is very keen on a re-adjustment of Poor Law, as he always has before his eyes the probable prospect of "going into the House," or at the best receiving out-door relief—in both cases being transmogrified from an independent working man into a pauper. He is therefore very anxious that some "reform" should be instituted, whereby he may receive assistance when he is past labour, without being under the ban of pauperdom.

Dr. Potter, of the Kensington Infirmary, issued invitations to the members of the British Medical Association in London, to visit the new buildings—the Nurses' Home and the Maternity Department.

The New Hospital for Women also gave an "At Home" to upwards of 100 of the medical men and friends who were attending the Congress.

At St. Bartholomew's Hospital the medical and surgical staffs entertained, on July 31st, at luncheon, 200 members and distinguished guests of the Association. Mr. Thomas Smith presided, luncheon being served in the great Hall. A small octavo of 60 pages, entitled "A Brief Relation of the Past and Present State of the Royal and Religious Foundation of St. Bartholomew's Hospital," and compiled by Dr. Norman Moore, was presented to each guest.
