REPLIES TO CORRESPONDENTS.

A Trained Nurse.-There are excellent opportunities in private practice for a trained Nurse who has had, in addition, private practice for a trained Nurse who has had, in addition, experience in Insane Asylums. Excellent salaries ranging from \pounds Ioo to \pounds I70 a year are gained by skilful Mental At-tendants on the well-to do. Of course the work is specially trying, for which reason it is better paid. As you state that your Nerves are "made of iron" you ought to stand the strain excellently well. Miss E. Brown.—See answer to above re Asylum Attend-ants' prospects. You could easily, with a little economy, manage on the salary you would gain in the first year as an Asylum Attendant. The salaries range from $\pounds 17$ a year, going up to $\pounds 33$. But as you have had such splendid Hos-

going up to £35. But as you have had such splendid Hospital training you would not need more than one year's experience in an Asylum. With that you should be perfectly equipped for a Mental Attendant to a private case. Miss Elder.—Probably the drink you refer to is what is called the gum-arabic drink. It is made by dissolving an ounce of pure gum-arabic in a pint of boiling water, adding two tallespoons of sugar, a wine-glass of sherry, and the juice of a large lemon. Cool, and add ice.
