Your age is right, your health is good, and, if you will pardon the personality, there is a business-like and common-sense ring about your letter which suggests many of the qualities a Nurse needs. You could then judge which best suited your requirements, and apply to the different Matrons. Of course you may have to wait some time for a vacancy, but in provincial Hospitals, where, often, the training is admirable, it is easier to gain admission.

One who wants to be a Nurse.—You are rather young to be thinking of becoming a Nurse, and will have plenty of time for preparation. You are 16 now. Some Children's Hospitals take probationers at 20, so you have four years, during which time our advice to you would be to improve

during which time our advice to you would be to improve your *general* education as much as possible. Attend classes

on Ambulance, Nursing, Hygiene, and Cooking. Learn French and German. Read the text-books you mention, and as many others as you can get, and learn as much of domestic work and housekeeping as you can. In Northampton you will find many educational facilities.

"One in a Difficulty."—Your best course would be to

write again to the Matron of the Hospital that has accepted you as a probationer, and put your circumstances and the difficulty you are in before her. Of course vacancies sometimes occur quite unexpectedly, and you may be fortunate in getting in soon. If you do not get a satisfactory reply, you should apply to another Hospital. 
