Royal British Murses' Association.

(Incorporated by Royal Charter.)



THE meeting of the General Council took place on Friday, the 10th of July, at the offices of the Corporation.

Present : Her Royal Highness, the President, in the chair, and about 30 medical men and Nurses. The absence of Matrons is a fact deeply to be deplored.

The following reports from the Hon. Treasurer and the Executive Committee were read and adopted.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

As your Hon. Treasurer, I beg to submit my first budget to the General Council, for the financial year

ending March 31st, 1896. The receipts on the general account, including bal-The receipts on the general account, including bal-ance at the bankers of $\pounds 317$ 10s. 7d., have amounted to the sum of $\pounds 1,218$ 15s. 2d. In this total are com-prised donations, &c., $\pounds 139$ 17s. 1d.; subscriptions for three years, $\pounds 150$ 13s. 6d.; life subscriptions, $\pounds 159$ 12s. od., and annual subscriptions, $\pounds 271$ os. od. The receipts for the Conversazione for 1895 amounted to $\pounds 126$ os. od., and the expenditure to $\pounds 112$ 13s. 8d., leaving the satisfactory profit of $\pounds 13$ 6s. 4d.

 \mathcal{L}_{13} 6s. 4d. The sale of badges produced the sum of

£34 195. 6d. The expenditure for the same period amounts to the sum of £1,121 175. 7d., which leaves the sum of \pounds 96 17s. 7d. to our credit at the bankers.

The expenditure includes legal expenses on the general business of the Association, amounting to £43 75. 11d. ; while the special expenses connected with the trial of Barlow v. Thorne and others, which Mr. Justice Stirling decided were to be paid by the Corporation, figure for no less a sum than £102 5s. 5d. The total expenses of this trial have already entailed a pecuniary loss to our Association of \pounds_{155} os. od., leaving still an amount due to our solicitors of about £100.

It will be seen that there is a loss of nearly $\pounds 20$ on the account of the educational and sessional lectures delivered during the last year, but against this there is a set-off of an excess of receipts over expenditure in 1895 of about \pounds_{16} 10s. od., leaving a deficiency on the double course of lectures of about \pounds_{3} 10s. od.

The Journal Account shows that $\pounds 50$ is. IId. have been received from advertisements, while printing, stationery and postage amounted to $\pounds 160$ 175. 2d., leaving an adverse balance of $\pounds 104$ 155. 3d., which sum has been transferred from the general account.

The Registration Account reveals an expenditure of $£_{363}$ 6s. 2d., and the receipts amounted to $£_{183}$ 6s. 2d., showing a deficit of £180, which has been transferred from the general to the Registration account. The audited accounts show that the total amount

advanced to the Registration Board for its work to the present date is $\pounds 1,140$.

I think this amount is represented at too high an estimate, and is due to the fact that the salaries and office expenses have been up to the present equally divided between the General Account and the Regis-tration Account. This assessment, in my opinion, and
