The Sir Julian Goldsmid Home of Rest for Murses.

IT will be remembered by our readers that Mrs. Lionel Lucas, with characteristic generosity, in 1890, advanced the Committee of the Home £3,000 to purchase and repair the freehold of 12, Sussex Square, Brighton, and that she has since declined to accept even a nominal rate of interest upon that amount. Early this year Mrs. Lucas proposed that the loan should be regarded as a definite gift from her on condition that the Home should in future be known by the name of her late much-lamented brother, Sir Julian Goldsmid. The Committee gratefully accepted this gen-erous offer, and determined that the monies invested in the names of the Trustees-the Duke of Abercorn and the Right Hon. Sir Francis Jeune — amounting to about £650, should be regarded as the nucleus of a Endowment Fund.

Toynbee Mursing Build.

THIS Guild is recruited from certificated members of women's "First Aid" and "Nursing" classes, held under the auspices of the St. John Ambulance Association. Since the formation of the Guild, rather more than six months ago, special monthly lectures have been delivered to it by eminent members of the medical profession. In addition, weekly instruction in bandaging has been given by Sister Receiving Room of the London Hospital. A nucleus of a special library of Nursing literature has been collected and copies of the "Nursing Record," and other papers, circulated at weekly meetings. Visits have been paid to Guys, London, and Poplar Hospitals, and the Mile End Infirmary. The members do not wear a uniform, nor call themselves "Nurses," but are endeavouring to qualify themselves to render nursing assistance to the poor in their homes, by working under the direction of District Nurses, giving that extra help which the hard-worked District Nurse often finds physically impossible. Further information may be obtained from the Hon. Secretaries, Miss M. M. Wills or Mr. W. H. Winny, at Toynbee Hall.

On July 14th an open-air concert for Ambulance students was given in the picturesque quadrangle at Toynbee Hall. Canon Barnett (warden) and Mrs. Barnett welcomed the guests, and, in an interval of the concert, Col. Bowdler presided whilst Mrs. Stephen Mackenzie presented medallions and certificates to successful students. A display of ambulance work was also given under the direction of Superintendent Winny of the Toynbee Hall Division, St. John Ambulance Brigade. It was announced that six classes had been held during the past session, and 200 men and women instructed in ambulance work at Toynbee Hall.
