THE NEW ANNUITY SCHEME.

 $\checkmark$  OME three weeks ago, we described the important scheme for Nurses issued by the Pearl Life Assurance Company, and showed the remarkable difference in the premiums charged for annuities by that Company as compared with those of the Royal National Pension Fund. Great curiosity was felt to learn the opinion which would be expressed by Sir Henry Burdett's paper on this important matter, and that curiosity has now been undoubtedly converted into astonishment.
