'Nurse Marian,' on the ground of avoirdupois, and a very vexation of spirit to 'Cappy, but not Hairless,' on the score of the utter impossibility of 'getting it up.' The writer at the time expressed a feeble-minded opinion that if ever Midwives became entitled to put on their Parliamentary cap, they would have to submit to no inconsiderable loss of the natural head covering with which Nature had provided them—whether 'golden' or otherwise—every time they took it off. Was it this dread possibility that led the great majority of us to prefer being individually an 'Institution' to collectively an 'Institute'?"

WHILE all honour is due to Lady Dufferin for the grand work she is engaged in for India, I wish some one would obtain her active interest in the equally great necessity which exists for English women to have efficiently Trained Nurses in their illnesses, and for the necessity, therefore, for the speedy adoption of the State Registration of these workers. It is good news for the friends of Lady Dufferin's excellent movement for supplying female medical aid to Indian women, that the Princess of Wales has consented to become Patroness of the Association. Few English people know the immense boon which Lady Doctors confer on their patients in the zenanas, and the gratitude which is felt throughout Hindostan for this token of English kindliness to the native races. We may hope now to see the Association for providing this sorelyneeded aid as vigorously supported as it deserves to be.

I AM glad to hear that Miss A. Steele Perkins has been appointed the Matron of the Women's Convalescent Home at Rhyl. Miss Perkins worked first at the Royal Alexandra Hospital for Children, at Rhyl, and afterwards obtained her certificate at the Royal Scuthern Hospital, Liverpool. My correspondent adds that Miss Perkins became a member of the B.N.A. last year, having been engaged in Nursing work for upwards of eleven years. I have been much impressed by the fact that nearly all the Nurses who have lately been appointed to Hospital Matronships say they are Members of the Association. This can only mean one thing. It is the most energetic and best educated women in the profession, who now-adays obtain these posts, and therefore it is these women who have at once realised the value to themselves and their calling of this great professional Association. I am glad to hear that Miss Hicks, who, I gather, was trained and worked for some years at St. George's Hospital, has been elected, out of forty-four candidates, Matron to the Wrexham Infirmary.
