REPORTS OF INSTITUTIONS, ETC., COMMUNICATED AND COLLECTED.

A FIRE broke out at the Leeds General Infirmary recently in the Nurses' bedroom on the second floor. Dr. Littlewood and the members of the Resident Medical Staff, with a number of Nurses, having unavailingly tried to extinguish the flames, Superintendent Baker was informed of the outbreak, who, with his brigade, promptly arrived, and soon got the flames under. It was found that a bed and the bedclothes had been on fire, caused by a defect in the fire-place, the skirting-board having become ignited. The Nurses who occupied the room are the chief sufferers. The damage is not serious, and is covered by insurance.

annual meeting of the Association, held in St. Mary's Hall. There was a large attendance of ladies. The report, read by Mr. W. F. Wyley, J.P., showed that 6,937 visits had been paid by the Nurses (the Misses Wing), that there was a balance in hand of \pounds_{25} 5s. rd., and that the Association had received \pounds_{250} left by the late Mr. David Spencer. The noble chairman moved the adoption of the report, and spoke of the excellent work that had been done for the last three years, while at the same time he described as a disgrace to humanity the Workhouse Nurses, who went into the villages to Nurse the sick poor. The resolution was seconded by Dr. Milner Moore, and carried. The Council was re-elected on the proposal of the Mayor. Several other gentlemen also spoke, and there was general praise of the Nurses' labours. Lord Leigh, in acknowledging a vote of thanks, said it was rather painful now to come out of the old county of Warwick. into the new county of Coventry, but he hoped the two counties would always go hand in hand.

WITH the assistance of Lord Radnor, the authorities at Folkestone have just decided upon a site for a new Hospital near Radnor Park. The Hospital, which is to be a memorial of the Queen's Jubilee, will, it is understood, be a very handsome building, and nearly $\pounds 14,000$ has been subscribed towards the cost.

COMPLAINTS are made that far more Hospital accommodation is required in Santiago, Chili, the two male Hospitals and the one female Hospital already existing being usually filled to overflowing, and having to refuse numbers of deserving cases almost daily.
