### Editorial.

THE INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF WOMEN.

ARRANGEMENTS are being rapidly prepared for the Meeting of the International Council of Women, next year, in London; and we are glad to be able to give our readers an early account of what will, doubtless, prove to be one of the most important gatherings of women which has ever been held.

To those who are unaware of the progress of events, it may be explained that some ten years ago it was decided to organize an International Council of Women, so as to draw together representatives of women's societies throughout the world, in one central organization; and that efforts should be made in each country to weld together all their existing associations of women, by offering each, one or more representatives upon its National Council of Women. By this means, it was evident that greater unity of working and much economy would be effected, by saving the efforts at present made by different societies which, working for one common object, necessarily overlapped, and were wasted.

In the United States of America, the international idea was most warmly received, and it was, therefore, felt that a meeting of the International Council should take place at Chicago, during the year of the great Exhibition. Unfortunately, when that meeting was held, the movement had not yet achieved any definite results; and, whilst delegates were present from various British Societies, they were unable to
