THE PRINCE OF WALES' FUND.

LETTER has been addressed to us by the Executive Committee of the Prince of Wales' Hospital Fund requesting us to refer to the present position of the Fund. We have much pleasure in doing so because it is almost needless to say that we have the greatest respect and admiration for the efforts' made by His Royal Highness on behalf of the charitable institutions of this country. At the same time we should fail in loyalty if we followed the attitude adopted by those of our contemporaries who do not understand the difficulties of the Hospital problem and who, therefore, accord to it unqualified and in-discriminating praise. We are constrained to regret that the Fund has been given a permanent character; for we have good reason to believe that it would have been much more successful, more universally popular, and much more useful to the hospitals if the movement had been limited to the formation of a commemoration fund, without involving a permanent

organization.
