Editorial.

A POINT OF PROFESSIONAL IMPORTANCE.

THE current number of the Nurses' Journal reports the resignation of Miss Entwisle, who, it will be remembered, took an active part in supporting the Hon. Officers of the Royal British Nurses' Association in their determined attack upon the liberties of the nurse members of that Association, which culminated in the passing of the new Bye Laws. Miss Entwisle, having deliberately helped to place the noose round the neck of the nurses, cannot complain, now that it is in position, if the Hon. Officers pull the cord and make its presence uncomfortably felt. Of course they pull the cord; why else did they take the trouble to arrange the halter? There is a modicum of justice in the fact that Miss Entwisle is one of the first to suffer from the tyranny of the new Bye Laws. But whilst unable to condole with her that the retribution which she has brought upon herself has fallen, we most heartily sympathize with her point of view in the matter which led to her resignation. It is difficult to glean an accurate account from the pages of the Nurses' Journal, as we are well aware that only "edited "accounts are admitted to that publication, but we gather that Miss Entwisle, being a member of the editorial committee of the Nurses' Journal, raised an objection when she found that an editor had been appointed to the journal without the formality having been gone through of consulting either the Editorial Committee or the General
