Mr. Fred. N. Chauncy, the American journalist, who knows that Lucille is not Miss Ames, and whose middle initial stands, she feels convinced, for Nemesis!

These are all good; and very girlish and natural and silly is Lucille's precipitate journey to Schlangen-Bad, with its incidents of travel. The parlour-maid episode is the one that most defies probabilities; but it is very amusing too. The unsatisfactory part of the book is the end; one would have liked to know how Griffith took the knowledge of her wild journey and her wilder masquerade, all undertaken on his account. He is such a particularly nice hero that we should wish to see more of him.

We should like to see more of Mrs. Williamson too, and that, we hope, will be a pleasure in the near future. There is a light, easy grace in her writing, which never jars upon you; and a strain of optimism which is compatible with the incidents of real life. The episode of the two unfortunate little men who wrote a play has real pathos in it.
