Editorial.

THE NEW SOUTH WALES TRAINED NURSES' ASSOCIATION.

TURSING organization is in the air. Within the last few weeks it has been our pleasurable duty to record the initiation of the International Council of Nurses, the Danish National Council of Nurses, and the League of St. Bartholomew's This week we publish at length the details of the post graduate course arranged for future Superintendents of Training Schools in connection with Columbia University, at the request of the American Society of Superintendents, as well as the regulations for an Army Nursing Reserve now being organised in New South Wales, and it is, further, a great gratification to us to announce the formation of a Trained Nurses' Association in the same colony. meeting convened for the purpose of receiving the report of a Committee appointed to arrange a scheme of constitution was held in the Royal Society's Rooms, Sydney, on July 21st, when nearly 100 nurses were present. The chair was taken by Dr. Graham, who said it was a matter for congratulation that the meeting was so large, and the presence of so many nurses interested in the question of organization demonstrated its need.
