The League of St. Bartholomew's Hospital Nurses.

ON Saturday last a general meeting of the League of St. Bartholomew's Nurses took place in the Great Hall of the Hospital. The occasion



is memorable, for not only was it the first meeting of the League since its inauguration, but it is the first time that this noble old Hall has been placed at the disposal of the nurses for professional

purposes. The beautiful Hall looked its best on this sunny July afternoon. A platform covered with crimson cloth, had been erected at the further end, and clever fingers had arranged palms and flowers to the very best advantage. From the walls grave surgeons and physicians, and past Treasurers, looked down benignly on the Matrons and bonnie nurses who thronged into the room. Not so, Henry VIII. He glared down from behind the President's chair at the unusual and entirely reprehensible spectacle of a meeting of women who knew their own minds, and did not hesitate to express their opinion upon their own concerns, and could he have found words to express his wishes, they would certainly have been "Off with their heads."
