

American Nursing Notes.

THE COLORED HOME AND HOSPITAL, NEW YORK CITY.

To all those who believe in the future of coloured races, to whom the pathos of their disabilities—the result, in a great degree, of lack of educational advantages in the past—appeals; the knowledge that there exists, in New York, a “colored” hospital, nursed by colored nurses, for whom it has a well organized training school, must be of great interest. Of the hospital

description is given by the Corresponding Secretary. “The class of nurses now numbers twelve bright, intelligent, interested young colored women, who are diligently trying to fit themselves for this new profession, which we hope will open to them a useful and acceptable means of livelihood, and at the same time make return to us, in the skilful and intelligent nursing given by them to our inmates during their two years’ course of training. They not only serve in the operating rooms, hospital and home wards, but are prepared to give special care to patients in

itself, the Commissioner of the State Board of Charities, after an exhaustive examination of every part of the institution, said, “I have no hesitation in saying that there is no superior class of buildings in this State, devoted to charitable purposes. What I especially commend is the simplicity of the structure, showing proper economy in building, convenience of all parts, which suggests precision of administration, and improved sanitary structural arrangement in all the details of the entire group.”
