International Notes.

A letter has been received by Miss Dock, Secretary of the International Council of Nurses, from Miss McGahey, Lady Superintendent of the Prince Alfred Hospital, Sydney, accepting the invitation to act as the Vice-President of the Council for the Australian Commonwealth, which office entitles her to an ex-officio seat on the Executive Committee until such time as a sufficiently representative society of nurses is organised to become the National Council of Nurses of Australia.

Mrs. Quintard, one of the American Councilors of the International Council, will leave Puerto Principi, Cuba, at an early date to assist in the organisation of nurse training in the large Civil Hospital in Santiago de Cuba. The hospital at Puerto Principi is now in fairly good working order. It contains about 100 beds, and with the help of half a dozen capable American nurses, Mrs. Quintard has been able to establish a training school, numbering twenty-five young Cuban women, whose intelligence and aptitude for the work has given cause for gratification and encouragement to their teachers. The medical men are also very pleased with the nurses' work.

Miss Martha Farquharson—Hon. Member Matrons' Council—has now begun her new work, having built for herself, and organised a private hospital at Corowa, New South Wales. Upon resigning her position of Lady Superintendent of the Melbourne Hospital, Miss Farquharson was the recipient of many beautiful gifts. The Committee of Management presented the Hospital Certificate for Good Service, signed with its seal of incorporation, her splendid work for the institution having been greatly appreciated by the majority of the Board. The Nursing Staff showed their affection by giving a beautiful Crown Derby tea service, fine cut glass decanters, and half a dozen fruit dishes.

The Domestic Staff presented a glass and silver butter dish, fine needlework tea cloths, and other gifts, and from a lady subscriber a handsome sideboard, leather arm-chair, and escritoire was received, so that Miss Farquharson left Melbourne with practical proof of the universal respect in which she was held. We wish her a happy and successful future in her new and more independent line of work.

Miss Farquharson is succeeded as Lady Superintendent of the Melbourne Hospital by Miss Amy L. Burleigh, late of St. Bartholomew's Hospital, who we are glad to learn applied for membership of the Matrons' Council before leaving Old England a happy method of keeping in touch with nursing at home.

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
