quarts, whereas the ordinary bed pans hold only about one quart or less.

3. It can be used also as a douche pan, the large opening above the back end permitting the physician or nurse to easily reach the parts to which the douche or injection is to be applied. This advantage alone will recommend the "Perfection" to physicians and trained nurses.

4. It is the only bed pan that is really sanitary and can be quickly emptied and readily cleansed, having no sharp corners and no spout.

This shaped pan is made in two sizes and in

agate enamelled ware, as well as porcelain.

The New Urinal for Women is also termed "Perfaction," is anatomically correct in shape, and remains in position without being held, which prevents soiling of the bed linen.

Legal Matters.

NURSE OR COMPANION?

At Liverpool last week Vice-Chancellor Hall delivered judgment in the case of King v. Wilson, which we reported in our last issue. He was of opinion that Nurse Wilson-whose defence for breaking the agreement made not to nurse within 25 miles of Southport for a period not yet expired, was that she was acting as housekeeper or companion to her patient, not as a nurse-was evidently doing similar work to what she formerly did, and that Miss King had made out her case. He therefore gave judgment for the plaintiff, together with an injunction in the terms prayed, with costs. He proposed that the order should remain in the office for a week, and had no doubt that the plaintiff, if approached, on behalf of the patient, would consider any reasonable application for the defendant remaining in her employ.

A BOGUS SOUTH AFRICAN NURSE.

The Glasgow police are anxious to warn the public against a young woman of prepossessing appearance who has victimized several landladies in the vicinity during the past week. She states that she is the daughter of a minister in the North, that she was for many years Matron of the Victoria Infirmary, and that she has just returned from South Africa, where she was attached as a nurse to the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. She tells some thrilling tales of her adventures and hardships on the veldt, and finally makes the discovery that she has lost her purse and induces the unsuspecting landlady to lend her sufficient to take her home. By this method she has succeeded in raising quite a number of small loans which, needless to say, are not returned, as promised, by the first post in the morning.
