Allen and Hanburys have now devised a bottle which is most easily cleansed, which has a pure rubber teat which can be turned inside out, which has a valve air inlet, by which air is admitted behind the column of milk, and through which, on the removal of the valve, a stream of water can be passed. The feeder is graduated so that the amount taken by the infant can be accurately estimated.
