The 'Registered Murses' Society.



The eighth annual meeting of the Registered Nurses' Society was held at 20, Wimpole Street, on July 24th, Dr. Bedford Fenwick in the chair.

The Hon. Superintendent reported that the year had been one of steady progress in every direction, and that the reports received from the medical men and patients for whom the

members had worked had expressed great satisfaction with their skill and conduct.

Fourteen new members had been appointed during the year, and it was proposed largely to increase the staff in the autumn, preparatory to the winter's work. Several members were still in South Africa working in the military hospitals, and also on plague duty in India, the Society having given these members indefinite leave without the payment of a percentage so long as their services were of value to the nation.

The Committee, in presenting their eighth annual report, have much pleasure in congratulating the Society upon its continued progress and success. As will be seen by the audited accounts, the Society has, during the past year, received £6,757, an increase of more than £460 upon the receipts of last year, which also exhibited a very considerable advance upon any previous year. The Committee have continued to act on the principles adopted at the foundation of the Society, only accepting for membership the best trained nurses, and only in sufficient numbers to meet, as nearly as possible, the demand for their services.
