THE SOAP BOTTLE CRADLE.

An ingenious and simple swing cradle, carrying a bottle for liquid soap, has been designed by Messrs. Reynolds and Branson, of Leeds, and will be appreciated, we believe, by both medical practitioners and nurses. The mechanism of the contrivance can be estimated by the accompanying illustrations. The bottle is made of brown non-actinic glass, with sandblast label, and can therefore be kept clean without difficulty. The amount of liquid used, which passes through a glass tube, in an india-rubber cork, tightly fitting the neck of the bottle, can be easily regulated, thus effecting great economy in the liquid soap this type have woven edges, thus preventing ravelling, and are at the same time elastic and porous. Their elasticity enables them to fit closely to any part of the body without undue pressure. Further advantages are that the width of the bandage is not affected by stretching or washing, and the woven edge prevents any ravelling. For bandaging varicose veins the crêpe bandage is specially applicable.
