# The British Gynæcological Society's Mursing Examination.

#### MATERNITY NURSE OR MIDWIFE?

The next examination of the British Gynæcological Society for its certificates in Maternity Nursing and in Gynæcological Nursing will be held during the first week of March. The standard required during this year by the Society is a minimum of two years' general hospital training, together with special training either in monthly nursing or in the gynæcological wards of a general or special hospital. This announcement reminds us that many nurses do not appear to realise the importance of the Midwives' Act of 1902 to themselves. A large section of them desire to take up monthly nursing, and doctors require that they should possess some special certificate of efficiency in that branch of work. Hitherto, of course, the only independent certificate which they could obtain was that given by the London Obstetrical Society, which testified as to their competency
