On the Infection of Phthisis and Measures of Prophylaris.

Lecture to Probationers, National Sanatorium, Bournemouth.

It is only within the last few years that pulmonary consumption has been classified amongst the diseases which are communicable from man to man.

In former days, as it was thought to be due to hereditary influences, and "to run in families," no precautions were taken to prevent the patient from spreading the disease amongst those with whom he lived; the natural results ensued—the parent in-fected the children, and the children each other, and so a vicious circle was established, which, gradually enlarging, included in too many cases not only the members of the same household, but also relatives and others who came much in contact with the sick man.

The lingering nature of the malady, the prevailing want of knowledge as to its causation and proper methods of treatment, and the frequent protraction of the later stages, all combined to make a consumptive patient a source of very great danger to those around him, for until the advent of the parish and district nurse the care of our sick poor in their cottage homes depended entirely upon the unskilled but kindly help of feminine relatives and neighbours, who, in their utter ignorance, took not the slightest precautions against contracting the disease themselves or letting others run grave risks. So completely has public opinion changed in regard to the infectivity of consumption, that you will find nowadays patients suffering from phthisis not infrequently shunned as though tubercular disease were as easily transmitted from one person to another as scarlet fever, and many people will never, if they can possibly avoid it, enter even the grounds of a sanatorium, much less visit the wards or shelters in-habited by the patients.
