

suggestion amazes me, and I would fain hope that Miss Monk cannot have realised what her suggestion means. It means, in brief, that no nurse could be supplied to the public except by a registered association; in other words, she suggests the creation by the State of a new monopoly. It only requires a moment's thought to see that the machinery for licensing, registering, and supervising such "nursing associations" would involve the greatest difficulties and expense. A nurse who offended the manager of one of these institutions could be professionally ruined. It is absolutely certain that within twelve months after the institution of such legislation, all the existing registered associations would be banded together to keep competitors out of the field, to raise the price of nursing services to the public as much as possible, and to pay the nurses they employed as little as they could, and so keep them as completely in subjection as human tyranny could suggest. The public would be helpless, the nurses would be merely bond-slaves. When one considers the inevitable outcome of such a system it is difficult to speak calmly. All I can say is that the sooner the public and the nurses arouse themselves and denounce the tactics of those who would thus hand nurses over, bound and fettered, to the will of their employers, and place the sick at the tender mercy of associations formed for the purposes of commercial profit, the sooner will the public and the medical and the nursing professions be protected by the passing of the Registration of Nurses' Act.
