### A Loss to the Army Nursing Service.

Why may one retain the office of Lord Chancellor with an income of £10,000 till eighty, and another be compulsorily retired from the office of Matron-in-Chief at the age of fifty-five? Is a man at eighty more vigorous than a woman a quarter of a century younger? We doubt it.

We are moved to this reflection upon realising that Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service is in January next to lose the services of its first and its most efficient Matron-in-Chief, Miss Sidney Browne, R.R.C., just as she is beginning to reap some result from the experience and skill which she has been able to devote so wholeheartedly to the organisation of the nursing of our sick soldiers under the new regulations. Miss Browne's retirement will be a very great loss to the Military Nursing Service, and as she enjoys delightfully robust health, and is still as bright and energetic as a new pro., we can but hope that the profession may still benefit by her admirable work in some distinguished position.
