they have formed the subject of investigation by a medical inspector of the Local Government Board, whose report has usually been made public. Occurrences of cerebro-spinal fever have also been observed in Scotland and Whether cerebro-spinal in Ireland. fever is spread by direct infection from person to person is matter of uncertainty; indeed, there is as yet no definite knowledge as to the way or ways in which its transmission may take place. Since, however, the possibility of direct personal infection cannot, on the evidence available, be excluded, it will be wise to endeavour to secure, as far as practicable, the isolation of the sick from the healthy. It will also be advisable to apply suitable measures of disinfection to premises that have been occupied by the sick and to articles that may have been in relation with them.'
