"CRANIOTOMY IN A GARRET."

We found the usual condition of things—fire almost dead, one tiny kettle, the only basin full of potato parings, the bed a study in rags, and in an adjoining veritable "Black Hole," peacefully sleeping, five children. Our patient had had pains all the previous day, and on examination the os was found fully dilated, and the diagnosis an ordinary L. O. A. An enema was given, but still the uterine contractions continued weak, and at irregular intervals.
