such increasing traction from the growing uterus upon its fixed stony outgrowth on the pelvic floor.

The teaching of these cases is clear. Whenever menstruation ceases, in a patient suffering from fibroid tumours of the womb, the possibility of pregnancy should be at once considered, and its existence or absence decided. In the former case, if the child cannot develop, or, cannot be delivered normally, the mother's life is almost certainly in danger, and the sooner these dangers are recognised and averted, the better will be her chance of recovery.

## International Rews.

We learn from the United States that the interim Conference, to be held in Paris in June, 1907, is already a matter of professional interest. The Nurses' Journal of the Pacific Coast says "Californian nurses should number among those attending from America. Plan for this meeting, all who possibly can, and Californian nurses must aim to bring this International Association to the Golden State some time in the future.'

As Miss L. L. Dock, the Hon. Secretary, is busy at home this year, working in collaboration with Miss Nutting on the great History of Nursing, the Hon. President, Mrs. Bedford Fenwick, will visit France this autumn and take counsel with Dr. Anna Hamilton and other ladies interested in nursing in France, and map out practical arrangements for the Conference.

It is to be hoped that there will be present quite a little crop of professional editors of nursing journals. It is proposed that The Ethics of Professional Journalism shall be one of the questions to be brought forward and discussed in Paris. No one could handle the question more ably than Miss Sophia Palmer, the Editor-in-Chief of the American Journal of Nursing.

Inspection of hospitals and analogous institutions will be one of the most interesting additions to the Conference, and the social side is to be made as enjoyable as possible. We would invite the professional nursing journals of the world to give all the help and publicity possible to the arrangements of the Paris Conference so that it may be as mutually serviceable as possible.
