THE HOME SANATORIUM, BOURNEMOUTH.

Many of those who wish to obtain the benefits to be derived from a visit to Bournemouth for the restoration of health, combined with medical and nursing care, will be glad to know

of the advantages offered by the Home Sanatorium, Southbourne Rd., Bournemouth.

Whatever may be the diversity of opinion as to the desirability of living in the open air there can be none

as to the virtue of this treatment in arresting the progress of phthisis. In this connection open air treatment is now recognised as being of primary importance.

The Home Sanatorium is situated within three miles of the Bournemouth Station and a mile and a half from Boscombe, and is designed

for the treatment of patients on the chalet or hut system, as our illustration shows. Its situation is admirable, as it stands in its own grounds and is within 600 yards of the sea, so that it has the advantage of sea

air, which is recognised as a valuable aid in the treatment of phthisis. At the same time, it is 150ft. above the sea level, and has beautiful views of the valley of the Stour, while forest trees and evergreen pines protect it from the prevailing winds.

Each chalet is furnished with a reclining chair or couch, and table, and fitted with electric light, while some have also a bedstead and bedroom furniture, so that the cases who are ordered to sleep in the open air can use them in the day time as well as at night. Our illustration of the croquet and Badminton lawns

shows not only something of the extent of the grounds and also the back of the main building of the Sanatorium, but also the opportunities afforded to the patients for a pleasant sociable country life not only

croquet and Badminton, but tennis and bowls, and other outdoor games can be indulged in.

The walks in the grounds are of varying gradients, arranged so that carefully regulated walking exercise can be carried out, while the surroundings are of such beauty that the duty of carrying out the prescription as to

exercise must be a very pleasant one.

There is a medical officer, Dr. J. R. Morton, who devotes himself entirely to the treatment and care of the patients, and a nursing staff under the direction
