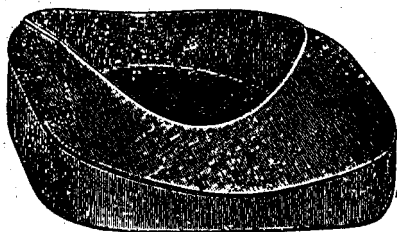

The test of the nursing is, whether you have your patient thoroughly warm and comfortable, or chilly and miserable—and your success is according to the result.

#### Chorea.

In his *Golden Rules of Sick Nursing* Dr. W. B. Drummond says concerning this disease,

"Keep the patient recumbent. The heart is often affected.

"If the movements are at all violent pad the sides of the cot to prevent injury.

"Guard against anything which may startle or annoy the child. Sudden awakening from sleep may do harm.

"Do not allow visits from other children, nor too many from adults. Isolation is a valuable part of the treatment.

"Give plenty of nourishment, but avoid the use of a knife and fork for eating and thin glasses for drinking."
