knowledge of nursing might prove very helpful. She would, if necessary, make a gruel for the mother, or an ordinary poultice, or might see that baby's bottle was thoroughly clean, and that the baby itself was comfortable, and might also tidy the house. Help of this kind would, I am sure, be of great use in the dwellings of the poor in these lesser illnesses; and I feel equally certain that it would pave the way for the kindly and favourable reception of Bible ministrations.

No longer or more detailed course of instruction for the ordinary Biblewoman is advocated than I consider is desirable for women generally. Why should young women not be taught simple nursing as a part of their education, just as they are being taught sewing, cooking, &c.? The need for that knowledge is too sure to come as years pass, when they have taken their place in family life. As I have indicated, it is not necessary for the acquisition of the small amount of special knowledge required for the less important ailments that they should be trained in hospitals or at dispensaries. Instruction similar to, but less technical and simpler than what has been given for many years by Mrs. Strong, the Matron of the Glasgow Royal Infirmary, would suffice.
