St. Thomas' Hospital and the London Hospital have both been en evidence this week. On Thursday, the Annual Meeting and Party of the Nightingale School was held at St. Thomas' a great function at which nurses trained in this School meet together and greatly enjoy re-union, and on Friday Mr. Haldane is announced to

honour the London by presenting prizes to students and nurses; a very interesting ceremony which takes places yearly, and which might be followed by other hospitals where doctors and nurses work harmoniously to help the sick.

The authorities of the National Hospital for the Paralysed and Epileptic have made an arrangement whereby probationers will receive a three years' training, the second year of this to be passed at a general hospital or infirmary! This scheme will simplify the difficulties of those wishing to enter the nursing profession through the National Hospital, but who are deterred from so doing by the lack of general nursing experience to be gained. It will also be of advantage to those who desire to benefit by the teaching of treatment by massage and electricity which is such a feature at the National, as in exchange for the probationers, nurses will be received who will during their stay receive the special teaching. The Lady Superintendent will be pleased to hear from any Matron of a General Hospital who may be interested in this arrangement.

At a meeting of the General Committee of the Miller Hospital and Royal Kent Dispensary, Greenwich, recently held, a course of three years training with salary and also uniform during the whole time was adopted, instead of the present training of only two years with no salary or uniform the first year.

It being recognised by the Committee that only a nurse with three years training has any chance of obtaining the higher appointments previous page next page
