WOMEN The Committee of the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies have very carefully considered how best to carry into effect the advice given by the Prime Minister to the great Depu-

tation which waited upon him on May 19th :---" What you have got to do is to 10 on converting the country as you have been doing during the last half dozen years.'

Spade work has got to be done in the constituencies, so the Suffragists are going to do it. They are pre-paring a specially active campaign, meetings will be held, literature distributed, petitions will be pro-moted and in all legitimate ways the justice of the claims of women to representation will be pressed upon those who still think that the advantages of representative government should be confined to onehalf of the population. It has been decided to raise a fund of £1,000 to £1,500 to carry out the work, and there is no doubt every self-respecting man and woman should subscribe to it. Address the Hon. The next forward step will be taken at Copenhagen, where the International Women's Suffrage Alliance meets on Tuesday, August 7th, extending over the week. One great feature of the Conference will be the meeting on the afternoon of August 8th, to be devoted to appreciation of the late Miss Susan B. Anthony, the splendid pioneer and leader of the movement. A brief sketch of her blameless life and work will be given by Miss Ida Husted Harper, of the United States. Mrs. Fawcett, LL.D., will deliver an address of appreciation on behalf of the English National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies. This will be a very great occasion, and one not to be missed.

Meanwhile, how goes it with the brave women who, during these summer days are immured in prison for conscience sake? We should pity them if we did not know the joy of the strong in resisting oppression ; it is one of the few things which thrills. Their release is already being demanded by just men.

A number of prominent leaders of the Feminist movement have decided to celebrate the appointment of Mme. Curie to the Sorbonne by making her a valuable presentation. A subscription is to be opened exclusively among the women of France. The committee announces that the presentation will take place in October, when Mme. Curie takes up the professorial chair occupied by her late husband.
