Lights should be lowered in his vicinity, and the ward or room kept as quiet as

possible.

Patients who sleep badly must not be allowed to drink tea or coffee, to read or write, talk much or excite themselves in any way just before their hour for settling down which should be as nearly as possible the same every night.

Night nurses should be careful that their own squeaking shoes, or too highly starched dresses are not a source of annoyance, and that they make no undue noise during the

A calm, soothing manner, an absence of flurry and haste will quiet a nervous patient better than any opiate, and by her personality and quiet efficiency in this matter, a nurse may often succeed where drugs alone have failed.
