Considering the importance to the Spanish Nation of an heir to the Throne, it is not surprising that the announcement that an English doctor and nurse are to be in attendance has caused some heartburning, as Spanish physicians naturally consider that they should attend the Queen on this important occasion. No doubt the position can be adjusted to the satisfaction of all concerned by the joint attendance of an English and Spanish physician. Queen Victoria should have the best attention—whether of the land of her birth, or of her adoption—which is obtainable. We all remember the tragedy which befel the present German Emperor at his birth, and have no desire to see it repeated.

Nursing has so far not advanced in Spain to the extent in which it has developed in other European countries, and it seems natural that the Spanish Queen should seek for her nurse in her native land. Still, we presume babies are born and successfully reared in Spain!

A meeting of the Catholic Nurses' Association took place on April 18th, at "The Settlement," 109, St. George's Road, Southwark, Miss du Bose (who is in charge of the Settlement) and Miss Gossage acting as hostesses.

The Very Rev. Father Galton, S.J., gave a most interesting address, choosing as his impressive subject the feast of St. Joseph. To-day he wished to put before them the life and character of St. Joseph, because he had found that the idea of devotion to saints was weakened by specialism, and that he himself had proved that St. Joseph was a special help in temporal matters.
