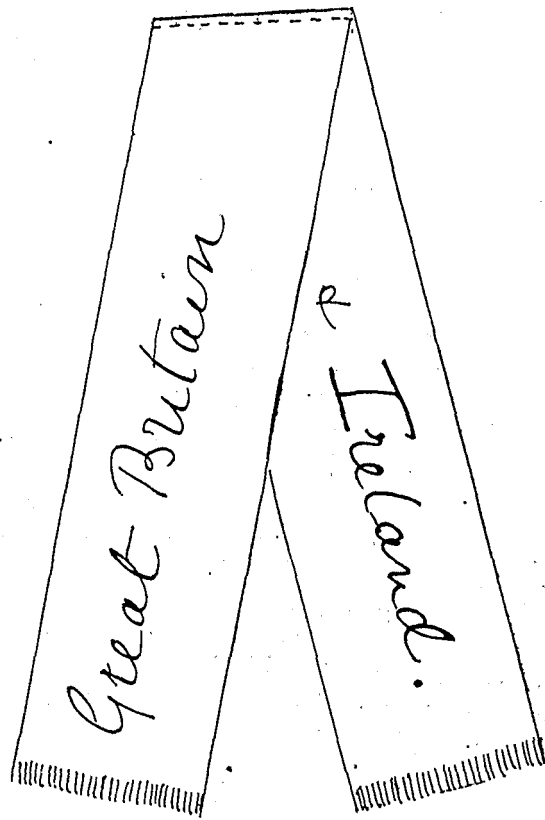

The Paris Conference.

All members of Societies affiliated to the International Council of Nurses can wear the ribbon notifying their country, a pattern of which is here produced, at the Paris Conference. The badge should be made of white satin ribbon one inch wide, and just to gratify our national sensibilities it should be embroidered in the colour of our national flower, the English, rose, the Scottish, mauve (thistle), and the Irish, green (shamrock).
