### THE PARIS CONFERENCE.

The arrangements for the party of 40 going to Paris *via* Dieppe on the 17th June are now complete, and no more names can be added to the list, as the arrangements have been concluded in Paris.

The Irish Nurses' Association have made the following terms for those wishing to join the Dublin party. They will be received at the Hotel Burgundy, bed, lights, attendance, breakfast, and dinner, eight francs a day; and for single bedroom and breakfast at the Hotel de l'Arcade six francs, a double-bedded room five francs. The ticket will provide saloon on Irish boat, third class to London and back, and first class from London to Paris and back. Price for return ticket from Dublin £3 16s. 3d., and from Belfast journey and hotel £5 12s. 5d., for five days in Paris, 8 francs a day beyond that time. Passengers can go any day from Dublin to London; but must all travel together from London to Paris.
