

Reception at the Nursing School in the Rue Amyot.

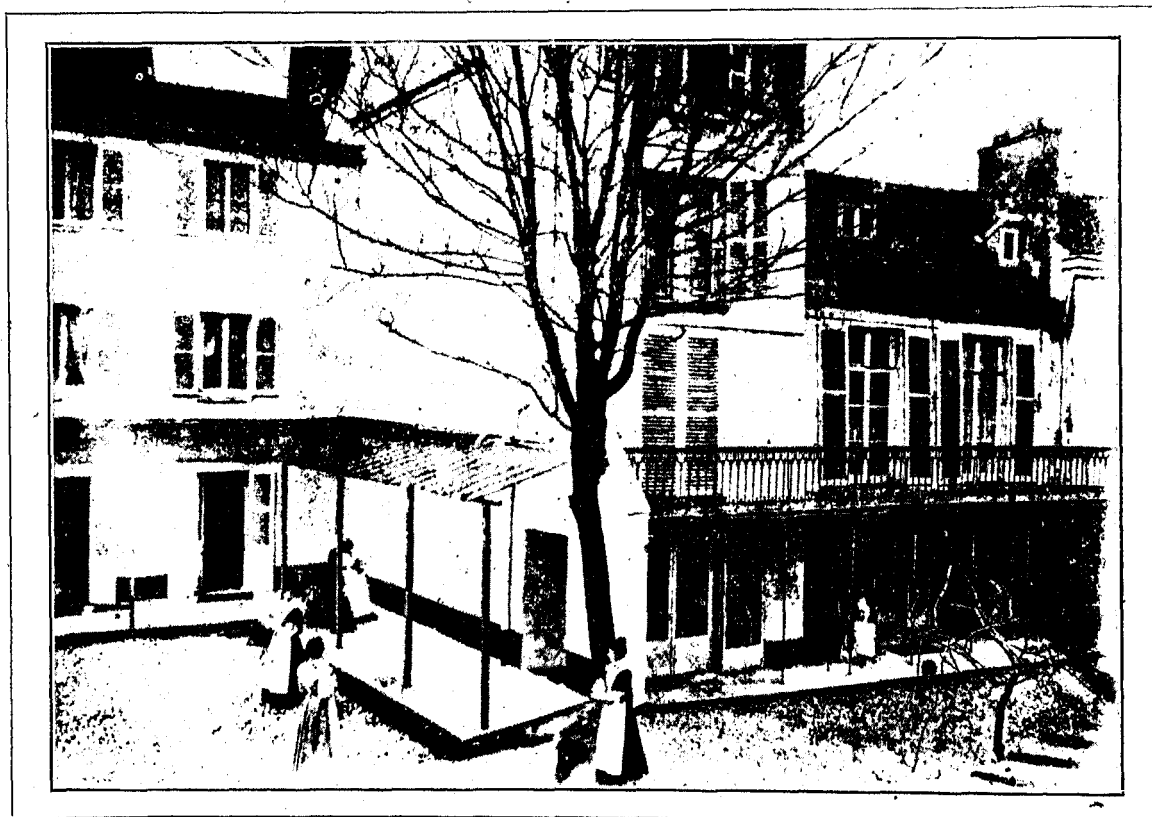
