to the Annual Report of St. Peter's Hospital, Henrietta Street, Covent Garden, W.C., Mr. J. Pardoe, F.R.C.S., one of the Assistant Surgeons, said that he was very pleased that reference had been made to the nursing at the hospital, for he knew of no hospital in London or in the Kingdom where the nursing was so arduous or severe. The majority of their patients had had very serious operations performed on them, and they were advanced in years, and when they considered that in many cases the dressings had to be changed half a dozen times a day they would get some idea of the arduous work which fell upon the nursing staff. In addition to that the hospital was par excellence a surgical hospital. They had to use the knife to assist nature, and their patients required the most careful nursing. He wished to thank the resident staff, the Matron, and the nurses for the assistance which they gave the surgeons in their work.
