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sleeping rooms for the attendant nurses.

On the lower floors each Sister and Staff Nurse has a charmingly furnished bedroom, much more space having been allotted to each, than was contemplated in the original plan. The Matron's apartment is self-contained, the rooms are not large, but are most tastefully decorated, and combine to make a very dainty habitation, full as they are of fine prints, bricà-brac, and a wealth of flowers. The whole Home is exquisitely kept, a great credit to the Home Sister and domestic staff.

The Hospital and Home have not yet been officially opened, but it is anticipated that when her Majesty returns to England, she will name a day for the ceremony. Anyway, it is an institution to which Queen Alexandra may with great gratification and pleasure accord the prestige of her honoured name.
