#### Rewards for Courage and Service.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, as Grand Prior of the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England, presented at Marlborough House on Monday medals for acts of gallantry in saving life on land at imminent personal risk, and "Service" medals to members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade.

Amongst those honoured was little Lily Madeline Wood (aged 15), to whom a bronze medal was awarded for conspicuous bravery displayed at Salford on the 29th of March, 1907. A baby was wandering on some electric tram lines when a car came along; the driver applied his brakes, but the car could not have stopped before striking the child had not the girl Wood rushed forward, at the risk of her life, and snatched the baby from the front of the car, which travelled some distance further and brushed against the girl as she stepped back with the child in her arms.

Service medals were awarded, amongst others, to 2nd Nursing Officer Elizabeth Brunning, No. 1 Nursing Division, Metropolitan Corps; and Nursing Sister Amelia Kennett, No. 1, Nursing Division, Metropolitan Corps.

We are always pleased to note increase of pay for nurses working in Government Departments, as there is such a serious difference when their pay is compared with that of similar male workers. The Government of India has sanctioned increased pay at the rate of twenty-five rupees per month to nursing sisters and senior nursing sisters in Queen Alexandra's Military Nursing Service for India, on completion of five years' service in either of those grades.

We know from the letters of the late Miss Catherine Loch, R.R.C., how very arduous the work in the Indian Nursing Service is, and as this work is of the very greatest value to our sick soldiers it deserves good pay.

A meeting of Queen Alexandra's Committee in connection with Queen Victoria's Jubilee Institute for Nurses was held at 26, Bruton Street, on Wednesday, at half-past twelve, when Adeline Duchess of Bedford presided, and the report of the Executive Committee to her Majesty was submitted for approval.
