Adeline Duchess of Bedford, recently nominated by her Majesty to succeed the late Countess Cadogan as President of Queen Alexandra's Committee, presided recently at a meeting of the Committee, held at her London residence.

The Committee was formed in 1906, and comprised twenty-five members, each of whom undertook to collect £100 on behalf of Queen Victoria's Jubilee Institute for Nurses. Lady Cadogan died before she could see the full fruition of a scheme for a permanent committee of at least 200 members, pledged to collect £10 each, and so provide an annual income of £2,000, but the new President has taken up the work with enthusiasm.

The President's draft report to the Queen was submitted and adopted. It was decided to add Lady Lurgan, the Countess of Crewe, Lady Weardale, the Hon. Lady Herbert, Mrs. E. de Lisle, and Mrs. Rube to the Executive Committee.

The President announced that about one-third of the members of the Committee had already raised their contribution for the year, and it was hoped that in future the collectors would all have their lists complete for the Queen in July. For the current year the time was extended to November.

The Queen opened the new building of the Hostel of St. Luke at 14, Fitzroy Square, London, on Wednesday. The original hostel was in Nottingham Place, and was founded for the benefit of poor clergymen and their families, to provide for them skilled medical and nursing care at the least possible cost, and so useful has the institution proved, that it has now moved into its spacious new home, where a greatly increased amount of good work can be done.
