WE have received the March number of "The Mother's Companion." It is a wonderful pennyworth: about fifty pages of wholesome and profitable reading.

A SPLENDID portrait of Mr. H. M. Stanley is given with the March number of "A1," a specially interesting magazine for family reading. The articles and illustrations are good, and the whole periodical has a thoroughly healthy tone about it, and there is plenty for the money.

"THE Making of a Great Magazine," is the title of the history of "Harper's Magazine," and consists of fifty pages of most interesting matter, interspersed with a large number of specimen illustrations, beautifully executed, forming one of the most delightful threepennyworths (for such is the price) we have ever come across.
